Please come to Taiheiji on Sunday, June 5 at 9:00 a.m. for the Jizo-Ko Service and Kannonko. Ojizo-sama, also known as *Jizo Bosatsu*, is housed in front of the temple, in our *Nokotsudo* (columbarium), and in our Kannondo (Kannon Hall). *Ojizo sama* is the guardian of children and travelers. In Japan, *Jizo* statues made from stone can be found along the roadsides. Here in Hawaii, many of these stone statues were erected in various locations along the coasts throughout our islands to protect fishermen, divers, and beachgoers. Please pay a visit to the temple on this day with friends and relatives.

In May, we honored our mothers at Taiheiji. We will pay tribute to our fathers in this month's service. Please join us as we pray for our dearly departed fathers and for the continued health and happiness of our fathers among us.

Soto Mission of Aiea Activity Center and Legacy–Endowment Bond Updates

Groundbreaking for the Soto Mission of Aiea Activity Center was scheduled to happen this summer, but ongoing delays by the Department of Planning and Permitting are threatening to push the date back further. In the meantime, Taiheiji will continue with its planning and fundraising for the project. If you are interested in purchasing Legacy-Endowment Bond, this may be your last chance to invest! The bond actually sold out by October 2021, but thanks to the generosity of a handful of investors, \$180,000 were donated back to the temple for resale. By January 1, 2022, only \$86,000 remained in available bonds. Now, only \$30,000 remain! Your bond purchase will help offset the increased construction cost caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Protective Masks at Taiheiji

Following the expiration of the statewide mask mandate on March 25, 2022, the Soto Mission of Aiea Board of Directors voted on April 24, 2022 to lift its requirement of wearing masks at Taiheiji. However, they continue to strongly recommend social distancing and wearing masks while at Taiheiji. The groups that use Taiheiji for their activities, like Taiko, Kendo, Karate, and Yoga, may set their own requirements on mask wearing.

Zazen at Taiheiji: Tuesdays, 6:00 a.m.

What is Zazen?

Zazen is a meditative discipline that is typically the primary practice of the Zen Buddhist tradition. In general, it can be regarded as a means of insight into the nature of existence.

Do I need to be a Buddhist to sit in Zazen?

Absolutely not! Everyone, no matter what their religious beliefs may be, should try to make meditation a part of their lives. The practice of Zazen is to make you a better self.

What is the Zazenkaï?

The Zazenkaï is a group that sits together in Zen meditation. They support one another in the practice of Zazen.

When does the Zazenkaï meet?

The Zazenkaï meets every Tuesday from 6:00 am to 7:00 am in the Taiheiji social hall. (First meeting is on May 3.)

I don't have any experience sitting in Zen Meditation. May I still join the Zazenkaï?

The Zazenkaï is open to everyone. No experience necessary. If you'd like, you may call Rev. Shuji to schedule an appointment for beginning instructions in Zazen, kinhin (walking meditation), and general etiquette.

Zazen Etiquette

All participants are to arrive a few minutes early and be seated **before** beginning time. Please refrain from talking. While at Taiheiji, participants are asked to abide by the following five precepts, which promote the harmony and wellbeing of the Zazenkaï.

- Refraining from killing and harming living beings
- Refraining from taking that which is not given
- Refraining from causing harm through sexual misconduct or inappropriate behavior
- Refraining from false speech, harmful speech, gossip, and slander
- Abstaining from drugs, tobacco and intoxicants that cause carelessness or loss of awareness

Please dress comfortably and in a way suited to visiting a spiritual place. Please do not use strong fragrances during Zazen. Outside food and drink, with the exception of water, are not permitted. You may select either a chair or zafu (cushion) on which to sit.

Zazenkaï Donations and Dues:

A small offertory bowl will be put out on the table. Your donations are greatly appreciated. You are also encouraged to (but not required to) officially join the Zazenkaï. Monthly dues for the Zazenkaï are \$40 and will be used to support Taiheiji and the meditation group. Thank you for your kind support.
