A Message from Rev. Shuji Komagata

Aloha! Greetings from sunny and beautiful Hawaii! I feel fortunate to live in a place where the people are nice, the food tastes great, and life seems worry free. However, even in paradise, we were reminded of how fragile life is when tragedy struck the town of Lahaina on Tuesday, August 8, 2023.

Much of Hawaii was under a red flag warning for fire risk when the wildfires broke out, with dangerous high wind conditions caused by Hurricane Dora, a Category 4 storm that was moving across the Pacific Ocean hundreds of miles south of the Hawaiian islands.

While the cause of the fire is still under investigation, the damage is clear—much of Lahaina's 2,700 structures destroyed and over a 100 people dead. The death toll is expected to rise as hundreds remain missing.

At the start of Taiheiji's Bon Dance on August 11 and 12, attendees offered their prayers of comfort and healing. Throughout both evenings, donations were collected at the Bon Dance for the wildfire victims.

The Hawaii Buddhist Council (HBC), comprised of the Higashi Hongwanji Mission, Honpa Hongwanji Mission, Jodo Mission, Nichiren Mission, Shingon Mission, Soto

Mission, and Tendai Mission, has set up a relief fund to help the people of Lahaina. The recovery and rebuilding of Lahaina will take years, but please act now and make a donation through the HBC (see info below)!

Additionally, three Buddhist temples belonging to the Hawaii Buddhist Council were destroyed in the wildfires—Lahaina Jodo Mission, Lahaina Honpa Hongwanji Mission, and Lahaina Shingon Mission. This will be the first step in the construction, expected to continue through much of 2024.



Higan Service

The following are excerpts from Bishop Jiho Machida's informational booklet, "Our Religion and Tradition."

- "...Our Autumn Higan Service is held traditionally to pay our respect to the founders of Soto Sect, Dogen & Keizan Zenji, with prayer for peace and happiness of all beings. Of course, paying our tribute to the beloved ones who have departed from us is the most important practice of Japanese Higan tradition..."
- "...As to Higan, there are many different explanations among Buddhists. For example, Higan is the time for us to practice six ways of self perfection to cross over from this shore, **Shigan***, to the other shore, **Higan****. Higan is also the time to visit the family grave, since the sun sets due west on that day indicating where Jodo (the Pure Land) is. They are well known explanations but many scholars disagree on this as to the origin of Japanese Higan..."
- "...Japanese Higan, as you know, is observed twice a year on or around vernal and autumnal equinox days. The dictionary explains equinox as the time when the sun's center crosses the equator and day and night are everywhere of equal length. It happens about March 21 or September 23. The two days are called "Chunichi" and three days before and after the Chunichi is Higan Week. During this week people usually visit their family grave yard to pay respect to deceased family members..."

*Shigan: Dualistic World, the world of happiness and misery, rich and poor

**Higan: Non-dualistic world, the world beyond dualism

Ryosoki Service

Ryosoki is the memorial services for the founders of the Soto Zen sect—Dogen Zenji and Keizan Zenji. Master

Dogen (1200-1253 C.E.) brought the Soto branch of Zen Buddhism to Japan after his 1223 visit to China. Master Keizan (1268-1325 C.E.) initiated the great social development of the Soto sect throughout Japan. Thanks in large part to these individuals, Soto Zen Buddhism has gained great popularity in Japan and throughout the world. (from the Sanbutsu)

Darumaki

The following section is an excerpt from the Soto Zen Publications, Zen Friends, Vol 12, No. 3, 2001

October the fifth is the anniversary of the death of Bodhidharma, the famous Indian monk and founder of Zen (Chan in Chinese) Buddhism. Heir to the teachings of the Buddha, he traveled to distant China, where he spread the Buddhist spirit through seated meditation, or zazen. Today, when mental magnanimity is greatly in demand, interest in zazen is rising. Bodhidharma physically demonstrated the quintessence of Zen, and his teachings preserve their vigor even now 1,450 years after his death. On the anniversary of his death, we of Soto Zen pay reverence to him and conduct ceremonies, like the Daruma-ki, to repay our debt to him.

During both September and October's services, prayers will also be made to Kannon Bodhisattva, who embodies the Buddha's teachings on love, mercy, and compassion. Through prayers made, Kannon ensures the safety of one's family, their good health and happiness.

Hawaii Soto Mission 120th Anniversary and Memorial Services for Keizan Zenji October 22, 2023

You are invited to attend three very important events held at the Soto Mission of Hawaii Betsuin (1708 Nuuanu Avenue, Honolulu 96817) on October 22, 2023:

Hawaii Soto Mission's 120th Anniversary Memorial Service and Commemorative Ceremony

Soto Zen Buddhism traces its roots in Hawaii back to 1903 when the Kauai Zenshuji and Waipahu Taiyoji temple communities were established. A memorial service is first held in gratitude with prayers made to all departed ministers and members of our temple community statewide. A special commemorative ceremony follows in observance of the 120-year journey of Soto Zen Buddhism throughout Kauai, Oahu, Maui, Molokai, and the Big Island.

Preliminary Memorial Ceremonies for the 700th Anniversary of Daihonzan Sojiji's Founder, Taiso Keizan Jokin Zenji (at 11:00 a.m.)

"Daionki" are major ceremonies held every 50 years to show our heartfelt gratitude to the two founders (Koso Dogen Zenji and Taiso Keizan Zenji) and the two second abbots (Koun Ejo Zenji and Gasan Joseki Zenji) of Soto Zen Buddhism's two head temples, Eiheiji and Sojiji. In 2024, Master Keizan's 700th Memorial Service will be held in Japan. Preliminary Services are held a year earlier in the Soto Zen Buddhism regions outside of Japan.

On Saturday, December 16, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., the Soto Mission of Hawaii will host a study session on the 16 Bodhisattva precepts, which serve as the foundation of all Buddhist thought and practice in the Soto Zen tradition. This study session is open to anyone, including those who have already studied the precepts in the past. The class will be held at the Soto Mission of Hawaii (1708 Nuuanu Avenue, Honolulu, 96817). Sunday, December 17 Lay Confirmation Ceremony

A Lay Confirmation Ceremony will be held on Sunday, December 17 at 10:00 a.m. at the Soto Mission of Hawaii. During this ceremony, participants formally receive the 16 Bodhisattva Precepts and confirm themselves as Buddhists.

Zazen at Taiheiji: Tuesdays, 6:00 a.m.

What is Zazen?

Zazen is a meditative discipline that is typically the primary practice of the Zen Buddhist tradition. In general, it can be regarded as a means of insight into the nature of existence.

Do I need to be a Buddhist to sit in Zazen?

Absolutely not! Everyone, no matter what their religious beliefs may be, should try to make meditation a part of their lives. The practice of Zazen is to make you a better self.

What is the Zazenkai?

The Zazenkai is a group that sits together in Zen meditation. They support one another in the practice of Zazen. The meditation group is beginning to grow!

When does the Zazenkai meet?

The Zazenkai meets every Tuesday from 6:00 am to 7:00 am in the Taiheiji social hall. Please contact Rev. Shuji at 808-488-6794 for the monthly Zazen schedule.

I don't have any experience sitting in Zen Meditation. May I still join the Zazenkai?

The Zazenkai is open to everyone. No experience necessary.

Zazen Etiquette

All participants are to arrive a few minutes early and be seated **before** beginning time. Please refrain from talking. While at Taiheiji, participants are asked to abide by the following five precepts, which promote the harmony and wellbeing of the Zazenkai.

- Refraining from killing and harming living beings
- •Refraining from taking that which is not given
- •Refraining from causing harm through sexual misconduct or inappropriate behavior
- •Refraining from false speech, harmful speech, gossip, and slander
- Abstaining from drugs, tobacco and intoxicants that cause carelessness or loss of awareness

Please dress comfortably and in a way suited to visiting a spiritual place. Please do not use strong fragrances during Zazen. Outside food and drink, with the exception of water, are not permitted. You may select either a chair or zafu (cushion) on which to sit.

Zazenkai Donations and Dues:

A small offertory bowl will be put out on the table. Your donations are greatly appreciated. You are also encouraged (but not required) to officially join the Zazenkai. Monthly dues for the Zazenkai are \$40 and will be used to support Taiheiji and the meditation group. Thank you for your kind support.
