### Fall Higan Service – September 7, 2025

Taiheiji's Fall Higan Service (*Higan-e*) will be held on **Sunday, September 7, at 9:00 a.m.** This biannual service, also observed in spring, is dedicated to remembering our departed loved ones with gratitude.

In Japan, the Higan observances traditionally coincided with the autumn and spring equinoxes—times when farmers gave thanks for harvests and prayed for their ancestors' blessings. Today, even if we are far removed from farming life, we too can reflect on the struggles and sacrifices made by those who came before us.

The September Kannonko Service will also be observed alongside Higan. A potluck brunch will follow the service, and all are warmly invited.



# Darumaki Service – October 12, 2025

Please join us on **Sunday**, **October 12**, **at 9:00 a.m.** for Taiheiji's annual Darumaki and Kannonko Services.

Darumaki honors Bodhidharma (Daruma in Japan), the Indian monk credited with bringing Zen Buddhism to China. Over centuries, stories about him have become legend—Daruma dolls, round and armless, symbolize resilience and persistence, while tea is said to have sprouted from his fallen eyelids to help practitioners stay awake in meditation.

Beyond legend, Bodhidharma embodied the essence of Zen through unwavering meditation practice. On his memorial day, we express gratitude for his life and teachings that continue to inspire us more than 1,400 years later.

The October service will also include prayers to Kannon Bodhisattva, who embodies compassion and mercy. Together, these observances remind us of both the strength of practice and the kindness of the Buddha's teachings. A potluck brunch will be served afterward. # Soto Mission of Aiea Activity Center Update

Major work on the Soto Mission of Aiea Activity Center is nearly complete. Just before the Bon Dance in early August, the new asphalt parking lot was laid, followed shortly by painted stall lines. Finishing touches are now underway: doors, ceiling fans, toilets, fixtures, and final coats of paint are being installed. Landscaping has also begun, with new greenery being planted across the property. Most notably, seven bodhi trees—six along the perimeter and one in the courtyard—are being added. These trees are cuttings from the original bodhi tree that once stood at the temple's front corner, ensuring its legacy lives on in our new grounds.









### **Nokotsudo Reopens**


The Nokotsudo (columbarium) at Taiheiji is now open weekly for visits:

During construction of the Activity Center, access to the Nokotsudo was limited due to blocked walkways and unsafe pathways. Now, with the new parking lot completed and paths cleared, families can once again visit safely and comfortably.



### Bon Services at Taiheiji

On June 19, 21, and 22, the Soto Mission of Aiea observed its annual Bon Services. The altar was lined with *otoba*—six-foot memorial tablets, beautifully inscribed in calligraphy—standing in quiet dignity to honor our departed loved ones. Led by Bishop Shuji Komagata, offerings of food, flowers, incense, candlelight, and prayer filled the temple with gratitude and remembrance.

Special *hatsubon* (first-year Bon) services were held for families who lost loved ones this past year. With flowers and bowed heads, they expressed deep reverence for their departed.

We extend heartfelt appreciation to all who helped make these services possible: our island ministers, emcees Todd Imamura and Robin Fujikawa, and the Tachino family, who graciously collected donations and distributed programs. Thanks to everyone's support, Bon at Taiheiji continues to be not only a solemn observance, but also a beautiful reminder of our unbroken bonds across past, present, and future generations.

Throughout the evening, our Bon Dance leaders guided everyone through joyful *minyo* dances.

We simultaneously held a Plant and Flower Sale outside the social hall during the Bon Dance. Thanks to many generous donations of items, we were able to offer a wide selection of flora and fauna to Bon Dance visitors.

We are deeply grateful to all who made this event possible—those who built and dismantled the *yagura*, strung lights, prepared food, and kept the festivities running smoothly.
