Deepening the Dharma: The 10th U.S. Soto Conference



On October 23–26, 2025, over 140 participants, along with 20 instructors and 40 staff and volunteers, gathered at the Soto Mission of Hawaii in Nuuanu for the 10th U.S. Soto Conference. Among the more than 50 priests present, we were honored to receive special guests Rev. Daiken Kurayama, Director of the Education and Dissemination Division at the Headquarters of Soto-Shu Administrative Headquarters of Soto Zen Buddhism, Rev. Tenyu Fukagawa, Director at the Soto-Shu Headquarters, Rev. Dosen Muto, Manager of the Dissemination and International Departments at the Headquarters, Bishop Gengo Akiba, of the Soto Zen Buddhism North America Office, and Rev. Konjin Godwin, Director of the Soto Zen Buddhism International Center.

Participants were welcomed into a well-organized format: each day offered a balance of lectures, hands-on activities, and opportunities for fellowship.

Opening Day: After a warm welcome, participants engaged in an orientation session, followed by the first round of workshops. The sense of arrival and mutual welcoming set a positive tone. Many commented on how "welcomed" they felt from the very start.

Workshop and activity days: Variety was a hallmark at the conference. Instructors led both traditional lectures and interactive sessions — from meditation workshops to arts-and-crafts related to Zen practice, from group reflections to personal contemplations. The hands-on experiences like Juzu making, lei making, Zen Cooking, and taiko stood out. Many participants remarked on the attention to detail in the planning: well-timed transitions, clearly marked rooms, and friendly volunteers ready to assist.

Formal gatherings: The group of more than fifty priests added a strong presence of shared practice and tradition. The special guests contributed not only by teaching but by being among us as one community. Their presence underscored the conference's dual spirit: rooted in our Soto Zen tradition and yet alive to the needs of a contemporary U.S. sangha.

Closing reflections: As we came to the end, the words most heard were "thank you" and "see you next time." The variety of classes, the comfortable welcome, the sense of being part of a larger family — these were the take-aways many expressed. Our aim to deepen practice, foster community, and share the Dharma across the U.S. and beyond was clearly met.

In closing, we extend our gratitude to all instructors, staff, volunteers, and participants. The success of the 10th U.S. Soto Conference is a sign of vitality in our sangha, and a clear demonstration of the theme 'Sharing the Dharma' in action. Keizan Zenji's Birthday Service

Our Soto tradition in Hawai'i is traced back to our two founders, Dōgen Zenji and Keizan Zenji. While both are rightly celebrated as great teachers of Zen, Keizan Zenji is especially credited with initiating the rapid and wide-spread growth of Soto Zen throughout Japan. He laid the foundation for the development of the tradition by training numerous outstanding disciples who would carry the teachings of Shakyamuni Buddha into new contexts. With deep reverence and gratitude, we honour and pay homage to Master Keizan.

Eitaikyo Service

The Eitaikyo Service is held each year at Taiheiji as an annual memorial service for deceased members of our temple. What distinguishes this service Keizan Zenji from private memorials is that it is a "Perpetual Memorial." Members may make a donation (\$1,000) and non-members (\$1,500) to add the names of departed loved ones to the list. Prayers are made for these honorees each year as part of the service at Taiheiji, comprehensively read alongside the names of many whose memories span our temple's long history.

December Bodhi Day Service

The teachings of Shakyamuni Buddha have touched lives around the world. His words of love. mercy, compassion have helped countless persons find peace and happiness. Our Buddhist beliefs and practices trace back to a single pivotal event in the Buddha's life following quiet meditation beneath the Bodhi tree. Siddhartha Gautama attained enlightenment and became Shakyamuni Buddha, thereby revealing to all beings the way to end suffering.

On Sunday, December 14 at 9:00 a.m., Taiheiji will observe its Bodhi Day Service honoring the Buddha's enlightenment with our monthly Kannonko Service. Guest minister Rev. Masataka Hoshino from the Soto Mission of Hawaii will officiate. Refreshments will be served following the service. Feel free to bring food or desserts to share. 

Planting Roots: Taiheiji Activity Center Nears Completion

Major construction of the Soto Mission of Aiea Activity Center is now substantially complete. While we await the arrival of the doors and a few remaining items, the exciting moment of opening is near. The building will soon be ready for operation, in just a few months.

In the meantime, our temple vice-president, George Hokama, has been busy enhancing our temple grounds. He has planted a variety of fauna and flora around the property: vibrant hibiscus flowers, bamboo brought from the Imperial Palace in Japan, and 14 bodhi trees, all cuttings from the original bodhi tree that stood in the front corner of our property since the 1970s.

Just as these plants are beginning to take root at Taiheiji, so too is our sense of anticipation for the grand opening of the Activity Center. It is a time of promise and growth, not only for the building itself, but for our temple community as we look forward to the new ways we will gather, serve, and connect.

\$5,000 goal! Thank you to all winning bidders, generous donors, and everyone who helped organize and manage the event.





Zazen at Taiheiji

Tuesdays, 6:00 a.m.

What is Zazen?

Zazen is a meditative discipline that is typically the primary practice of the Zen Buddhist tradition. In general, it can be regarded as a means of insight into the nature of existence.

Do I need to be a Buddhist to sit in Zazen?

Absolutely not! Everyone, no matter what their religious beliefs may be, should try to make meditation a part of their lives. The practice of Zazen can positively affect your life and the lives of others around you.

What is the Zazenkai?

The Zazenkai is the group that sits together, thus supporting one another through the practice of Zen meditation. The meditation group is beginning to grow! We have six members who attend regularly!

When does the Zazenkai meet?

The Zazenkai meets every Tuesday from 6:00 am to 7:00 am in the Taiheiji social hall. Please contact Bishop Shuji at 808-488-6794 for the monthly Zazen schedule.

I don't have any experience sitting in Zen Meditation. May I still join the Zazenkai?

The Zazenkai is open to everyone. No experience necessary.

Zazen Etiquette

All participants are to arrive a few minutes early and be seated **before** beginning time. Please refrain from talking. While at Taiheiji, participants are asked to abide by the following five precepts, which promote the harmony and wellbeing of the Zazenkai.

- Refraining from killing and harming living beings
- •Refraining from taking that which is not given
- •Refraining from causing harm through sexual misconduct or inappropriate behavior
- •Refraining from false speech, harmful speech, gossip, and slander
- •Abstaining from drugs, tobacco and intoxicants that cause carelessness or loss of awareness

Please dress comfortably and in a way suited to visiting a spiritual place. Please do not use strong fragrances during Zazen. You may select either a chair or zafu (cushion) on which to sit.

Zazenkai Donations and Dues:

A small offertory bowl will be put out on the table. Your donations are greatly appreciated. You are also encouraged (but not required) to officially join the Zazenkai. Monthly dues for the Zazenkai are \$40 and will be used to support Taiheiji and the meditation group. Thank you for your kind support.



2026 New Year's & Daihannya Blessing Services

On January 1 at 9:00 a.m., we will gather at Taiheiji for our New Year's Daihannya Blessing Service. For temple members, their families, and supporters, visiting the temple on New Year's Day is a longstanding tradition that ensures a proper start to the new year. It is a special moment of renewal, reflection and community — the perfect time to pause and attune our hearts to the unfolding year. The service offers space for gratitude for the past year, mindful intention for the one ahead, and the warmth of being together in sangha.

During the service, Bishop Shuji, with the assistance of a minister from our main temple in town, will chant Hannya Shingyo, and perform the DAI-HANNYA TENDOKU. "Ten" means to roll, flip over, or spin; the ceremonial flipping that you will witness is the symbolical release of the Buddha's spiritual energy and wisdom. "Doku" means to read. As the ministers fan the Daihannya Tendoku—symbolic reading of the great 600 volumes of the teachings of the Buddha—they will recite the prayer that is translated as: "May the merits of this symbolic Daihannya reading become an added blessing for all of us." Taiheiji recently received the brand new Daihannya Tendoku books at Taiheiji.

Bishop Shuji will also bless the ofuda and all attendees at the service. We look forward to seeing all of you at the service! Don't forget to drop off your old ofuda and omamori for proper disposal. Light refreshments will be prepared and served in the social hall after the service. We are also seeking volunteers to help on January 1. If you are available, please contact us at 808-488-6794.
